1) Ordinance: Chapter 5. Businesses, Article 12. Regulating the Issuance of Special Amusement Permits for Establishments Licensed for the Sale of Liquor, Sections 5-201 and 5-210 (second passage)

Chairman Wyman read the following Ordinance:

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BATH THAT THE CODE OF THE CITY OF BATH, ADOPTED FEBRUARY 2, 1977, AND SUBSEQUENTLY AMENDED, BE FURTHER AMENDED AS FOLLOWS:

CHAPTER 5. BUSINESSES

Article 12. Regulating the Issuance of Special Amusement Permits for Establishments Licensed for the Sale of Liquor

Amend Section 5-201 to read as follows: Section 5-201. Purpose.

Purpose of this Article is to control the issuances of special permits for music, dancing or entertainment and facilities licensed by the State of Maine to sell liquor, as such special permits are required by 28 M.R.S.A. §702 28-A M.R.S.A. §1054. (Ord. 6/18/78)

Amend Section 5-210 to read as follows:

Section 5-210. Appeal procedure.

Any licensee who has requested a permit and has been denied, or whose permit has been revoked or suspended, may, within thirty (30) days of the denial, suspension or revocation, appeal the decision to the municipal board of appeals as defined in 30 M.R.S.A. § 2411 30-A M.R.S.A. §2691. The municipal board of appeals may grant or reinstate the permit if it finds that the permitted activities would not constitute a detriment to the public health, safety, or welfare, or that the denial, revocation or suspension was arbitrary or capricious, or that the denial, revocation, or suspension was not based by preponderance of the evidence on a violation of any ordinance, article, bylaw, or rule or regulation of the municipality. (Ord.6-28-78)

- (d) Water Street parking lot West side. No vehicle shall park in the Water Street parking area between the hours of 11:00 p.m. and 6:00 a.m. Parking on weekdays from 6:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. shall be permitted in the Water Street parking area upon obtaining a parking permit or stamp from the Finance Police Department, which shall be affixed on such vehicle in a conspicuous place. The fee for parking by said permit shall be set by Resolution of the City Council.
- ... Parking on weekends from 6:00 a.m. to 11:00 p.m. and on weekdays from 6:00 p.m. to 11:00 p.m. 6:00 a.m is unrestricted. (Ord.4/19/00)

(Resolution 5-6-92 (fee for use of the Water Street Parking Lot - west side - shall be \$40.00 per month effective for all months commencing September 1, 1992 until further Resolution of this Council)

- (e) Water Street parking lot East side. Parking in excess of two (2) hours is prohibited in said municipal parking lot to between 6:00 a.m. and 1:30 a.m. 5:00 p.m., and all parking is prohibited between 1:30 a.m. and 6:00 a.m., subject to other ordinances, in effect. ...
- (g) Commercial Street Parking Lot West side under Sagadahoc Bridge.
- ... and shall require a parking permit or stamp issued by the Finance Police Department, ... There shall be no parking in said lot from 11:00 p.m. to 6:00 a.m. At all other times, parking shall be unrestricted. This Ordinance and any revision or amendment to this Ordinance shall be in effect as long as the License Agreement or any extension or amendment thereto between the State of Maine and the City of Bath, above-captioned, shall remain in full force and effect.(Ord.11/15/00)

The City of Bath will hold a Public Hearing on May 6th, at 6:09 PM, in the City Council Chambers (3rd Floor) at City Hall to discuss an application being submitted to the Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance grant program on behalf of the Bath Police Department. The purpose of the grant application is to upgrade the interview room, exterior and interior security cameras, and recording devices for the building. Public comments will be solicited at this Hearing and will be submitted as part of the application. All persons wishing to make comments or ask questions about the grant application are invited to attend this Public Hearing.

Chief Field explained this grant is part of the Federal Stimulus Package and Bath's portion would come to \$14,360. He stated the Department planned to use the funds to up grade the security camera system outside and inside the Police Station and to upgrade the suspect interview room.

From Centre Street to Summer Street, 2 Hour Parking, except that the first space North of Centre Street shall be designated as 30 minute parking...

WATER STREET

East Side: From Vine Street to Centre Street, 1 Hour Parking; From Vine Street and running northerly 40 feet, No Parking; From a point 40 feet northerly of Vine Street to Centre Street, 1 Hour Parking; From Centre Street to Elm Street, No Parking.

West Side: From Vine Street to Elm Street, No Parking. From Vine Street to a point 40 feet South of Centre Street, 1 Hour Parking; From a point 40 feet South of Centre Street to Centre Street, loading zone; From Centre Street to Elm Street, No Parking.

13) Bond Ordinance: Aspen Lane Sewer/Stormwater Separation Project (first passage)

Chairman Wyman read the following Bond Ordinance:

BOND ORDINANCE

AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF GENERAL OBLIGATION BONDS OR OTHER INDEBTEDNESS FOR THE CITY OF BATH, MAINE, IN AN AMOUNT UP TO, BUT NOT TO EXCEED, \$72,500.00 FOR THE PURPOSE OF FUNDING FOR THE ASPEN LANE SEWER/STORMWATER SEPARATION PROJECT.

IT IS HEREBY ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BATH, AS FOLLOWS:

<u>Section 1.</u> That a sum up to, but not to exceed, \$72,500.00 is hereby appropriated for the purpose of providing the necessary funding for the Aspen Lane Sewer/Stormwater Separation Project.

<u>Section 2.</u> That, for the purpose of financing the aforesaid appropriation, authorization is hereby given to incur indebtedness by the issuance of bonds or other evidence of indebtedness of the City of Bath, in an amount up to, but not to exceed, \$72,500.00 under, and pursuant to, the Charter of the City of Bath.

<u>Section 3.</u> That any and all bonds, notes and other securities issued pursuant to this Ordinance may be payable in serial form in annual installments, which need not be equal, or under such payment terms or conditions as may be in the best interest of the City, but which shall be calculated to extinguish the entire debt at maturity.

<u>Section 4.</u> That the term of any bonds issued under the within Ordinance shall not exceed ten (10) years.

<u>Section 5.</u> That the proceeds of any bonds issued pursuant to this Ordinance shall be used only for those purposes specified in Section 1 above.

<u>Section 6.</u> That any proceeds of the bonds issued not used for the purposes specified in Section 1 shall be applied to repayment of the principal and/or interest of any such bonds.

<u>Section 7.</u> Any suit questioning the validity of this Ordinance shall be barred unless commenced within forty-five (45) days following publication of the Ordinance, said publication in accordance with Section 809 of the Charter of the City of Bath.

<u>Section 8.</u> The City Treasurer with the approval of the City Manager and the Chairman of the City Council may borrow money temporarily by the issuance of notes in anticipation of the issuance of bonds, subsequent to the authorization of this bond issue by the City Council of the City of Bath.

<u>Section 9.</u> That the City Treasurer, with the approval of the Chairman of the City Council and the City Manager, shall determine the date or dates, maturities, denominations, interest rate or rates and any other details of each issue of bonds and/or notes issued in anticipation of this bond issue.

<u>Section 10.</u> That any and all bonds and/or notes issued by the City pursuant to Chapter 6 of the Charter of the City of Bath or Chapter 8 of the Charter of the City of Bath shall be signed by the City Treasurer and countersigned by the Chairman of the City Council and the City Manager.

<u>Section 11.</u> That any and all bonds and/or notes issued pursuant to Chapter 8 of the Charter of the City of Bath shall be general obligation bonds of the said City.

<u>Section 12</u>. The City Treasurer, with the approval of the Chairman of the City Council and the City Manager, is hereby authorized to make any such bonds or notes authorized hereby subject to call for redemption with or without premium at the election of the City before the dates fixed for the final payment thereof.

<u>NOTE</u>: These funds are provided by the Federal Government under the Stimulus Program and administered by the Maine Bond Bank. It is anticipated that the funds will be provided interest free with 27.7% of the principal to be forgiven leaving a principal balance for repayment of \$52,399.00.

Councilor Pagurko made a motion to put this item on the floor for discussion. The motion was seconded by Councilor Winglass.

Peter Owen, Public Works Director, explained the money is part of the Federal Stimulus Program. He stated the City submitted about \$2.5 million worth of work to get funded and got \$72,500. Mr. Owen said the City would get \$20,000 in a grant to pay for a portion of the project. He explained the project would help with the Harward Street pump station overflow problems in that area.

G. Petitions & Communications: 6:30 PM

Chairman Wyman stated that he had received one communication from Tri-County Literacy and would discuss that during Budget Sessions.

Councilor Winglass stated he had been approached by citizens wondering about the street striping this year.

Public Works Director Peter Owen stated that the PW hoped to start the striping on Tuesday, May 12th. He explained that the weather had not been cooperating with the process due to the rain.

Councilor Omo asked on behalf of citizens in the Southend of the City as to what extent the road repairs will be done and if the sidewalks would be telephone pole free allowing for unobstructed access.

Mr. Owen explained that the contractor would be repairing the cross trenches and the damaged pavement adjacent to the sidewalk going in and the road would be paved in the Summer of 2010. He stated the poles now in the sidewalk's way would be moved.

H. City Manager's Report: 6:33 PM

The City Manager reported on the 2009-2010 City Budget.

Mr. Giroux started by explaining that the Capital Improvement Budget is a 5-year plan and a lot of the projects are funded with non-property tax money. He thanked the County Budget Committee and the RSU Board for doing such a good of putting together frugal budgets. He stated that the proposed budget has a decrease of 18.8% from last year, which is due to major projects at the landfill bringing in bond money which increases the revenues and then expended this bond money which increases spending. He said when the project goes away it makes it look like the budget has gone down but it actually hits on both sides, so it is a nonfactor. Mr. Giroux stated that the City's revenues, like most Cities in Maine, were down about \$250,000 or 2.5%. This results in a tax increase of about 1.86% and with the RSU's and County's numbers added it looks like the entire budget increase would be under 2%. He explained that this budget keeps spending down and people working.

K. New Business: 6:46 PM

Councilor Omo asked about plans to replace the City's flagpole in Library Park.

Mr. Giroux stated that project was not in the City's budget. He explained that the estimate to replace it was \$25,000, but hoped to discuss its replacement in future workshops.

The meeting adjourned at 6:47 PM with a motion by Councilor Pagurko, seconded by Councilor Omo. All were in favor of the adjournment.
