

1. The Regular Meeting of the Town Council of the Town of Plymouth was called to order by Mayor Vin Festa on **April 7, 2009 at 7:00 p.m.** in the Community Room, Town Hall. Members in attendance: Councilwoman Jacqui Denski, Councilman Peter Giancesini, Councilwoman Jeanine Jandreau, Councilwoman DiAnna Schenkel, Councilman Sekorski (arrived 7:11) and Robin Gudeczauskas, Council Clerk. Also present, Attorney Sal Vitrano.

4. Acceptance of Minutes of Regular Town Council Meeting, March 31, 2009

MOTION: To accept the Minutes of March 31, 2009 by Councilwoman Jandreau; second Councilwoman Denski. Discussion: none. Vote: unanimous.

MOTION: To amend the agenda to include Minutes of the Town Council of March 30, 2009 and March 31, 2009, by Councilwoman Schenkel; second Councilwoman Jandreau and the vote unanimous.

MOTION: To accept the Minutes of March 30, 2009 and March 31, 2009 by Councilwoman Jandreau; second Councilwoman Denski. Discussion: Councilman Giancesini stated he was here for the March 30th meeting and not for the March 31st and cannot approve on the 31st.

Vote on Minutes of March 30, 2009: unanimous.

Vote on Minutes of March 31, 2009: unanimous with Councilman Giancesini abstaining.

MOTION: To amend the agenda to allow for the purpose of receiving the Proposed ATV Ordinance from the Chairman to be submitted to the Town Attorney for review and legal opinion under Item 11, by Councilwoman Jandreau; second Councilwoman Schenkel and the vote unanimous.

6. Public Comments on Non-Agenda Items

a. Melanie Church 328 Main Street, (a) wonder if the Mayor could enlighten on some things brought forward for the fire department to purchase 3 areas of land and do design work. That is the word out around town and had not heard him mention about bonding. Mayor Festa responded if there is word about town he is doing something he needs to do something; know nothing about fire department purchasing land. He does know he has spoken about coming forward on bonding proposal and not been brought to inception yet. (b) Is fire dept on bonding thing. Mayor Festa stated he has no recollection of them proposing that. (c) The firemen are saying that. Mayor Festa stated they have no authority to buy land and he has nothing with the town and fire department buying land.

b. Ralph Zovich, 4 Knight Lane, would like to give update on status of budget development and the Council liaison can pick up anything he leaves off. BOF is working diligently to finalize the next budget. There have been a lot of issues and things brought forward ;the Mayor and Comptroller have done homework to save us some money; negotiations settled, debt service to pay principal for first year on school bond; economy in decline, revenues down and we are struggling to balance budget. Expect by Monday, April 13 that the BOF will come to agreement on budget and bring it to the public on April 21st and hope to see all members of the Council at THS. The public should make every effort to make it that evening and will see there are a lot of

compromises and sacrifices to make a balance budget. BOF goal is to do this with minimum layoffs and no tax increase. Hope that we get a budget together and agreement between different parties. Have tentatively cut request from BOE from \$300,000 initial request above and beyond this year's budget and cut back to \$175,000 and feel areas in budget they can look at. The problem is that we have no control over what is happening in Hartford; if the State Legislature cuts any more of our grants than currently projected we have to make that up dollar for dollar with tax increase or deeper and more severe cuts. If Legislature cuts it would put budget out of balance and hope everyone can make April 21st 7 p.m. public hearing followed by a joint meeting of the Town Council, BOE and BOF.

c. Diane Ciano, of Beautification Committee, 660 Greystone Road, distributed packet and read letter into record. She stated for the last 2 years the Greystone neighborhood has put together a cleanup and cleared extensive amounts of trash along Greystone and decided to have a sign put up that was user friendly that says thank you for keeping Greystone clean and green. Feel approach of positive signs along strategic Greystone roads reminding not to litter and would like permission to install 5 signs along 4 areas of Greystone and along Rt. 262, also called Spruce Brook Road, that 18"x24" aluminum, double sided and placed in strategic locations to be read in both directions. 4 signs on grey 4x4 pressure treated posts, framed. Sign 1 attached to existing town sign on 262 with approval of DOT; Greystone residents will be responsible for collecting for costs of sign, installation and maintenance; also feel 2 heavily dumped areas identified on maps and reports can benefit if the town installs two signs that say no dumping fine \$200 – which will hopefully deter people from dumping. She is asking the Town Council to support this grass roots request. Questions: Councilwoman Denski stated (a) concern is that current neighborhood is doing a great job and as time goes on you will not be around and are taking responsibility for project and what would happen if you are no longer there; Diana replied she has been there 30 years and hopes to be there 30 years longer, they have young children coming up and those children will do the same. If signs deteriorate they will take them down and may have to paint wooden posts. Wants to get the community in Greystone area involved and hopefully have neighborhood watch down the road and a lot of dumping is commercial dumping. If thank people in advance they may think ahead. (b) on her own road things sometimes fall to the wayside and in years ahead Council may not know history and questioned would Council need to give formal approval. Mayor Festa stated they have to go to Public Works, P&Z and DEP and something she will come back to Council after finalize her aspects to have our particular requests ready to meet any challenges. Councilwoman Jandreau stated if this goes by the wayside we will have ten years of clean road side and a good project, she is glad they are going to P&Z, love the sign and they will look very nice; good job.

d. Vicky Carey, 665 Greystone Road - to answer the question most of the people who live in Greystone area are all related in one way or another; cousins buying properties when aunt or uncle dies and people in there. There are only a few out of town who have brought properties but for the most part they are very close knit.

Discussion: Councilwoman Jandreau stated he has worked hard and done a great job and according to his letter he just does not have time to do this job and rather than hold position he resigns. We will miss him. Vote: unanimous.

b. To accept the resignation of Joyce Relihan from the Plymouth Housing Authority

MOTION: To accept the resignation of Joyce Relihan from the Plymouth Housing Authority by Councilwoman Jandreau with regret; second Councilwoman Schenkel with great regret.

Discussion: Councilwoman Jandreau stated being liaison she has done a super job on this board, they will miss her and leaves a great hole. Joyce is also the go between with Housing and Gosinski Park residents and works very hard and needs to slow down. Can’t say enough; she puts her heart and soul into things and part of a lot of organizations and she works very hard. Councilwoman Schenkel stated she has known Joyce for many years and the Plymouth Housing Authority was a great passion of hers and dedicated countless hours of improving and fulfilling needs of people and public service as long as remember; great loss; wish her well and hopefully will see her again in some other capacity. Vote: unanimous.

c. To remove from the table to accept the resignation of Robert Brown from the Planning and Zoning Commission due to changes in work schedule

MOTION: To remove from the table to accept the resignation of Robert Brown from the Planning and Zoning Commission due to changes in work schedule by Councilwoman Jandreau with great regret; second Councilwoman Schenkel with regret. Discussion: none. Vote: unanimous.

d. To remove from the table to appoint Ryan Tavenor to the Planning and Zoning Commissions as an alternate; term to expire 2/19/2013

MOTION: To remove from the table to appoint Ryan Tavenor to the Planning and Zoning Commissions as an alternate; term to expire 2/19/2013 by Councilwoman Jandreau; second Councilman Sekorski. Discussion: Councilwoman Jandreau asked for information as Mr. Tavenor is not in attendance. Mayor Festa stated what is on his application is all known and has interest in serving as alternate on P&Z; application read into record. Councilwoman Jandreau stated he is new in town and glad getting involved. Vote: unanimous.

10. Presentation by Connecticut Center for Advanced Technology/Tom Drejer, Fuel Cells for Municipalities

MOTION: To table by Councilwoman Jandreau; second Councilman Sekorski and the vote unanimous.

11. To Discuss and Take Action on Recommendation of Ad Hoc Committee on ATVS With Amendment to Receive the Proposed ATV Ordinance From The Chairman To Be Submitted To The Town Attorney For Review And Legal Opinion

Chairman Walter Lassy, 170 Poland Brook Road, Terryville – stated the Ad Hoc Committee put together a draft ordinance. They started meeting in September and wrapped up in early March and meetings were well attended by local residents. The Committee listened to quite a bit of input and more concern from one side of issue than other. Made a point of listening to every concern; did try to address main charge of illegal use of atv's; establish operating hours, buffer zone around properly lines and basically referred back to State Statutes. The State does have use of atv's covered well and Commission felt responsibility for public education and awareness and ordinance does refer and define State Statutes. There are some contentious issues in it; had a great committee and great secretary. Committee worked well together. Put good ordinance and no problem presenting for the Council's pleasure. Mayor Festa noted this Ordinance was just received tonight and needs review of Council and forward to legal counsel for his interpretation and if there are concerns or questions will come back to ATV Committee. Walt Lassy stated the Committee is open to more work on it. Council questions: Councilwoman Jandreau thanked the Committee for all their work done. Walt Lassy thanked the Council for the opportunity to do it and got to meet great people and hear views and genuine concern by property owners and it is a tough issue. Mayor Festa noted the Ad Hoc Committee will not be disbanded until have final report.

MOTION: To submit the proposed ATV Ordinance to the Town Attorney for legal opinion and review of Council by Councilwoman Schenkel; second Councilwoman Jandreau and the vote unanimous.

12. To Approve And Authorize The Mayor To Sign The Contract Between The Town of Plymouth and The State of Connecticut, DEP For The Landfill Closure Project

MOTION: To approve and authorize the Mayor to sign the contract between the Town of Plymouth and the State of Connecticut, DEP for the landfill closure project by Councilwoman Jandreau; second Councilwoman Schenkel. Discussion: Councilwoman Jandreau stated it is about time. Tony Lorenzetti stated procedural in nature for what needs to be filled out for the project. Mayor Festa thanked Mr. Lorenzetti for endeavors, hard work in bringing this to closure. Vote: unanimous.

13. To Take Action On The Recommendation From Planning and Zoning For Permit Fee Schedule Changes – Mayor Festa stated number of information pieces of paper in packet relative

to changes and fee schedules and does have piece of written correspondence distributed this evening from David Elder who clarified issues on what was presented in packet on fee schedules. It shows people who feel paying too much to the Town for fees and will see it is money paid to the State. Fishing license what is charge; Barbara Rockwell stated we get \$1 for each license sold. The most expensive is hunting/fishing \$28 and we do all paperwork. This is the same with P&Z as the State has gone up on fees. Councilman Gianesini said seniors pay zero dollars for their fishing license. Councilwoman Jandreau stated she was at the meeting where discussion was held on advertising fees which need to be published in a paper and their fees increased and trying to incorporate that into fee schedule.

MOTION: To table for time to review and have representative from P&Z attend to create dialogue on fees by Councilwoman Schenkel; second Councilwoman Denski and vote unanimous.

14. To Discuss And Take Action On The Lease Agreement Between the Town of Plymouth and Wolcott Sand And Gravel, Inc. – has since change in name form. Sal Vitrano, Town Attorney, stated the document asked to approve is substantially the same document presented in packet with minor changes. It has become apparent from discussion with the attorney of present owner it is owned by Plymouth Investments LLC not Wolcott Sand and Gravel and have altered documents to represent that. Wolcott Sand and Gravel is the landlord. Have been more specific with respect to paragraph 4 of use to which Town will put property it is leasing to deposit and retire road sand, top soil and other material accumulated from road excluding use of property for storage of material containing hazardous substances or debris. Document substantially the same in other respects. Portion of property at 99 Wolcott Road for period of 1 year for \$5,000 paid by Town; however, if any real estate or personal property taxes due by landlord and/or Wolcott Sand and Gravel that \$5000 will be forwarded back to the Town for payment of taxes. Town has option of extending. Councilwoman Schenkel, according to paragraph 2 the term is 4/1 thru 3/3/2010 for term of 12 months. Attorney Vitrano stated that should be March 30th. Councilman Gianesini asked if purpose is to reutilize some of the road sand in subsequent years or place to put it. Tony Lorenzetti stated on landfill closure we are not able to have landfill open during the week for contractors and are serving spot to bring our materials from road projects. This site was available and got recommendation for the Town.

MOTION: To approve the lease agreement between the Town of Plymouth and Plymouth Investments LLC by Councilwoman Jandreau; second Councilman Gianesini.

AMENDMENT: Councilwoman Schenkel stated she would like amend to include date of 30th of March; second Councilman Sekorski. Mayor Festa stated it should be March 31st and asked for Amendment to be rescinded. Councilman Sekorski rescinded his second and Councilwoman Schenkel rescinded her Amendment.

AMENDMENT TO AMENDMENT ON THE MOTION: To include the date in paragraph 2 to be continued through the 31st of March 2010 by Councilwoman Schenkel; second Councilman Sekorski.

Discussion on Amendment to Amendment on Motion. Councilwoman Denski has question with date; for instance it is still the middle of winter on March 31st and they do not renew the lease, do we have plan b. Attorney Vitrano stated the request was for a one year lease and paragraph 17 has the option to renew which is the tenants option to renew and have ability to do so.

Vote on Amendment to Amendment on Motion: unanimous.

Vote on Motion As Amended: unanimous.

15. To Set The Date of May 5, 2009 at 6:30 p.m. for Public Hearing On Small Cities Grant Application – Request from Town Planner, Khara Dodds, for public hearing to allow taxpayers and residents understanding of applicant for Small Cities and Grant and Housing Rehab components that Town received grant.

MOTION: To set date of May 5, 2009 at 6:30 p.m. for the Public Hearing on Small Cities Grant Application by Councilwoman Jandreau; second Councilwoman Denski. Discussion: Melanie Church stated that is the date of referendum of the budget. Councilwoman Jandreau stated that does not affect a public hearing on this as you can vote all day. Councilman Sekorski questioned what is public hearing and notification windows. Mayor Festa stated there is a time frame and Larry Wagner and Associates has made a request of this date because of lack of personnel from their office to attend a meeting on different date and time because they are throughout the State to answer questions. It is the third time the State has been reestablished and so much going on with fair housing workshops that the next date was May 5th. Councilman Sekorski stated he agrees with Councilwoman Jandreau as long as location is in different room. Councilwoman Jandreau noted voting on referendum on budget is from 6 a.m. until 8 p.m. and not stopping anyone from voting with this. Attorney Vitrano noted there is a Council meeting scheduled that day as well and it might be added incentive at public hear to vote or vice versa to attend. Vote: unanimous.

16. To Take Action To Authorize The Mayor To Certify Harwinton Avenue Road Project Under Section 1511 Of The American Recovery and Reinvestment Act – Tony Lorenzetti gave brief presentation stating requested by regional planning agency to have the Mayor certify this project. It is part of road projects that can get going quickly and at regional level being considered is milling and overlay project and Harwinton Avenue meets federal aid standard. The road is cracked; met with representatives from DOT there today to talk about project and what can do to get going. He did not have major concerns with a particular location of the project and one that will be funded through region and important road in town. Mayor Festa asked for clarification as there are many roads in town in disrepair and why pick Harwinton Avenue. Tony Lorenzetti stated it is a federal roadway and met certain requirements. Certain roads qualify and others don't and the location of this project from Rt 6 to Harwinton Ave turns before industrial park and the road meets geometric standard as one criteria and also of high enough level of use to meet criteria; other roads could not meet criteria needed.

MOTION: To take action to authorize the Mayor to certify Harwinton Avenue road project under Section 1511 of the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act, by Councilwoman Jandreau; second Councilman Ganesini. Discussion: Councilwoman Schenkel stated she finds it disheartening as she was born on Harwinton Avenue and area targeted for paving is in relatively good condition and the rest of Harwinton that connects the other end which is terrible. She knows that Mr. Lorenzetti cannot do anything and find as taxpayer and citizen it is frustrating to see this being done when others are in dire need of refurbishing and repaving. Vote: unanimous.

17. To Authorize The Mayor To Negotiate And Execute Contract Between Town of Plymouth and State of Connecticut/DOT – Mayor Festa stated this is a grant assignment certification for adult and elderly vehicle grant and the Council needs to certify the Mayor is eligible to the State of CT

MOTION: To authorize the mayor to negotiate and execute the contract between the Town of Plymouth and State DOT, by Councilwoman Jandreau; second Councilwoman Schenkel.

Discussion: Mayor Festa stated the present vehicle used for transportation for handicap and elderly is the town owned vehicle and have met 5 year limitation and this application is not only for securing a new vehicle and keep old as well and will have 2 vehicles on road to service the community. Through the contract we have endorsed and approved we also have additional time the van is available for evening participation in case of an event at the high school and elderly would like to go and can use van for that purpose. Vote: unanimous.

18. Council Liaison reports

a. Councilwoman Denski – report given on BOE; Parks and Recreation; Library Board.

Mayor Festa stated he did attend a student council meeting and very impressed with students and issue with cross country trail and walking trail for community throughout school complex, went through lengthy discussion, very impressed and will move forward to get together again with specific information on procedures to be followed, pleased to be a part of this, they have great desire to see the town grow and prosper.

b. Councilman Gianesini- attended P&Z, I/W, School Building Committee and WPCA meeting – with a brief overview of a special Council, School Building and P&Z meeting and miscommunication between boards. An update on WPCA and need to improve denitrification ability and seeking grant money.

Mayor Festa gave clarification on Booster Club scoreboard request and P&Z could not approve because the Booster Club is not the owner of the property and it is the School Building Committee who is owner and need via letter of acknowledgement to authorize the Booster Club to make application. Lines of communication are open and will be resolution with letter to P&Z from School Building

c. Councilwoman Jandreau – attend Housing Authority, Human Services, 3 Charter Revision meeting, P&Z. Did not attend Fire Commission due to conflict; did not attend ZBA due to special Council meeting. Public Works, Director, report read into record. Highway Superintendent report read into record.

d. Councilwoman Schenkel – gave report BOF meetings and budget process; EDC and may be another lot purchased in park and very encouraging; Blight is making progress. Holiday weekend be safe and happy

e. Councilman Sekorski, no report.

19. Public Comments

a. Melanie Church, 328 Main Street, the last meeting of Charter Revision voted to have public hearing on April 14 and meeting this Wednesday to have draft approved.

20. Council Comments

a. Councilman Sekorski – item in packet on monuments and glad we will get the book being published; Mayor Festa noted it is booklet form. Some of this information is astonishing and people do not realize historical significance of monuments in town and hopefully copies are available in the Mayor's office. Relayed to Tony Lorenzetti on calls from folks, and asked what is procedure of people who have damage due to plows or what is procedure for public knowledge. Tony stated they should call public works and report curbing damage; Dave stated he has asked people to be patient with public works in getting repairs done. Tony stated because of types of construction they tend to have more damage than like to see; sustainability in public works and doing things as alternative and shortly he will come before Council with engineering

standards as biggest problem is some spots with bituminous curbing which gets ripped up and look for something to stop damage. Also, thanked Mayor for efforts in joint meeting with School Building, P&Z and Council and a long time coming and hopefully everyone knows punch list and what needs to be done; thanks staff, building inspector and town planner of their response in meeting and everyone did a good job and hopefully issues resolved soon. Thanked Mr. Lassy because he is a friend and good to see him getting involved in the community.

b.
