V. <u>HUMAN SERVICES REPORT</u> – Heather Burns

November 2015 Human Services Report

Energy Assistance – BCO has been a tremendous help with energy assistance applications. They mailed the applications to both Eli Terry and Gosinski Park residents. I have received many calls for help with the applications. BCO has also trained the Director on the software program (this is a new program as of last year). Having the software in the Human Services office is a great help in the time it takes to do an application. BCO has also been helpful with residents needing oil when their application is taken. The Director is able to fax the application to BCO for immediate processing.

Our warm weather has been a huge help in the amount of requests for the fuel bank funds.

CHOICES – Medicare open enrollment is from October 15th-December 7th. I spoke at the November 10th Senior Citizen meeting to let them know it is important to check their Medicare during this time of year. Also, informed them of the Medicare Savings Program income guidelines. The Director has received many requests for assistance with Medicare both Advantage Plans and Part D enrollments or changes.

SNAP – Department of Social Services (DSS) is implementing a plan for able bodied persons without dependent children. Starting January 1st this group will have three months on SNAP and if they are not in job training or working at least 20 hours a week they will be discontinued. Many towns in the state are exempt, Plymouth being one of them, due to the high unemployment rate.

Dial-A-Ride – Heidi and I met with Cook Willow to let them know the program would be going out to bid in December.

Operation Fuel – The program ended October 30th and will restart in December.

Small Wonders – The Holiday Program is in full swing with 153 children/73 families. Trees were placed in the staff rooms at each school and in various businesses throughout town. There has not been a formal committee formed after the disband of the Small Wonders Back Pack Committee. A master spread sheet of sponsors has been compiled to use for future programs. Many volunteers have stepped forward to help in any way they can.

PEP(People Empowering People) - The Director was invited to speak with this group. The group was surprised at the amount of services available to the residents of Plymouth, Terryville and Pequabuck. Hopefully, they will pass the word and more people will take advantage of what the town/state has to offer.

Grants - We received half of the money asked for from the Main St Foundation – Women and Girl's time to start the classes.

Personnel – an assistant during the busy time of the year would be most helpful. I have had a few clients comment on the interruptions from people just walking in to people knocking on the door for immediate assistance. The Director has posted a sign on the door "for an appointment call" and it is in the Plymouth Connection to ensure enough time is set aside for you an appointment is recommended. There will be clients who do need to stop by due to lack of a way to call. In November alone there were 42 walk ins.
